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**Post-Imperial Democracies** Stephen E. Hanson 2010-07-05 This book examines the causal impact of ideology through a comparative-historical analysis of three cases of 'post-imperial democracy': the early Third Republic in France (1870-86); the Weimar Republic in Germany (1918-34); and post-Soviet Russia (1992-2008). Hanson argues that political ideologies are typically necessary for the mobilization of enduring, independent national party organizations in uncertain democracies. By presenting an explicit and desirable picture of the political future, successful ideologues induce individuals to embrace a long-run strategy of cooperation with other converts. When enough new converts cooperate in this way, it enables sustained collective action to defend and extend party power. Successful party ideologies thus have the character of self-fulfilling prophecies: by portraying the future polity as one organized to serve the interests of those loyal to specific ideological principles, they help to bring political organizations centered on these principles into being.

**The End of the Republican Era** Theodore J. Lowi 1995 In "The End of the Republican Era," Theodore J. Lowi predicts not only a collapse of the Republican coalition but also the potential collapse of the United States' republican experiment at large. Professing that the ideologies of dominant political coalitions contain the seeds of their own destruction, Lowi suggests that the efforts of a new conservative Right to enforce a national, religion-based morality has brought about the demise of the Republican era. A new, in-depth afterword by Lowi brings the text up to date with a discussion of political events since the book's original publication. Noting the appearance of the new Conservative coalition, whose ideology runs counter to that of the traditional Republican party, Lowi affirms that the Republican era did in fact come to an end during the 1990s, having morphed into a Conservative party.

**The Historical Origins of Republican Economic Ideology** John Christopher Becker 2022 This dissertation seeks to understand the historical origins of modern Republican economic ideology. I contribute to this topic by using computational text analysis methods to quantitatively characterize ideological language from the past and track its persistence into modern political speech. The first chapter tracks the persistence of segregationist language from the mid-20th Century in economic speeches today. The second paper focuses on the persistence of conservative and liberal language from the New Deal era. Finally, the third paper focuses on the specific issue of immigration and compares attitudes of politicians in the past vs. the present. I contribute to the economic history literature by more comprehensively quantitatively linking language from the past and present using innovative natural language processing methods and interpreting these findings within the broader historical context.

**German Nationalism and Religious Conflict** Helmut Walser Smith 1995-01 The German Empire of 1871, although unified politically, remained deeply divided along religious lines.
